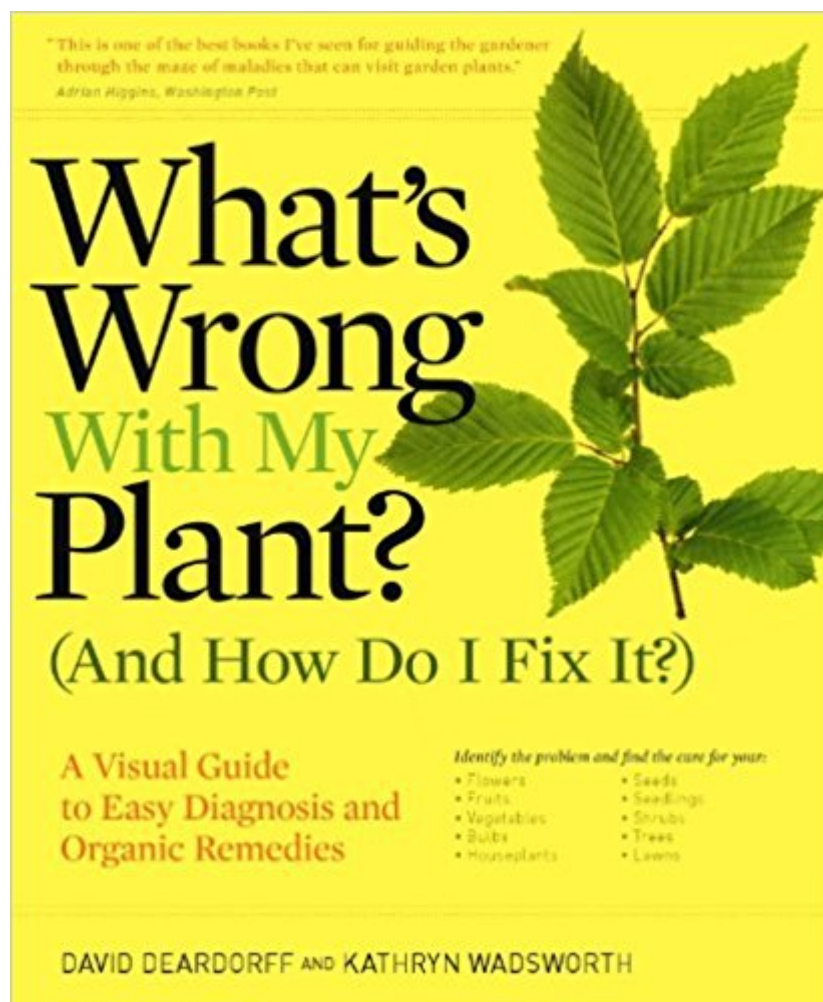

This book is just fantastic. I found that a lot of plant reference books do not transfer to our tropical environment in Hawaii. They are too mainland-centric. But this book helped me diagnose and successfully treat several lingering problems I had been having in my garden - from aphids, to sooty mold, to missing nutrients in my soil. The book is super easy to use, anyone can follow the clear illustrations and concise text. I also love the descriptive opening of each chapter. With so many potential causes for plant problems -- insects, bacteria, fungi, viruses and human damage --, this book does an excellent job of capsulizing the often complicated process of determining what a gardener is dealing with. Through a series of photos and flow charts, this book leads you to what is wrong with a specific plant and offers a series of steps to take to address the problem. It includes not only solutions for the plant being diagnosed, but offers steps on how to prevent future recurrences of the problem. I bought the book from .com and highly recommend it.

What's Wrong with My Plant? is a great reference for a beginning gardener like me who wants to stop her plants from dying, but doesn't have the time to identify each plant and read up on everything that can go wrong with it. I might not know the name of every plant in my backyard, but I know what a leaf is and that's enough for me to step through the flowcharts and figure out what to do next. I also like the emphasis on organic solutions. I bought three copies, one for me, and one for my mother and my sister (they're both very experienced gardeners and were just as thrilled with it as I was). This book is not as clear or easy to navigate as the authors claim, but it does have a good deal of useful information and quite helpful illustrations. You have to invest a fair amount of time getting familiar with how the book is laid out, and really scrutinize it for contents, but once you grasp the general pattern it's useful.

As a new gardener, this book has helped me tremendously. I normally use Google to resolve most

of my problems (gardening and otherwise) but this book is now my first resource for issues in my garden. The guide to identify issues with my garden, especially my vegetables, is easy to use and very organized. It also gives recommendations for how to resolve the problems (both organic and nonorganic solutions) and I have used the recommendations with success. I definitely recommend this book to anyone with a garden!

Finally, I have been able to identify what has been wrong with my plants and fix it! My tomatoe plant leaves have always been a problem. Other plant books I tried did not contain enough information. After using this book for two weeks, my tomatoe plants are greatly improved and producing better tomatoes. All my other plants are doing well too. A lot of thought was put into the way this book was written by the authors Deardorff and Wadsworth. It is an easy read. It is a perfect tool for home gardeners like me.

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
