While there 's a bit of history in this short diatribe, mostly it's socialist propaganda. Not really what I'd categorize as "history."

I didn't know much about Nicaragua, but I did know that a civil war raged there for years. When the socialist Sandanistas took power they were demonized as evil communists as bad as Pol Pot. Why did millions of Nicaraguans disagree? Why did they join up with the Sandanistas to overthrow a hated dictatorship? This book gives you a good idea of that. It's especially interesting to read now that a (very much capitalist) reformed Sandanista party is in power in Nicaragua while new civil wars driven against dictatorships are occurring in places like Syria.

Like many U.S. Americans I only knew of Nicaragua civil War from the capitalist and pro Contra view. This short book recounts history of FSLN (Sandinsta) as they fought the Somozas' and the National Guard. The book only highlights the achievements of the FSLN. I hope future editions will show the compromises the FSLN made to stay in power.

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
